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IMPORTANT SAFETY INSTRUCTIONS

READ ALL SAFETY INSTRUCTIONS BEFORE USING THIS MICROWAVE OVEN

WARNING - To reduce the risk of burns, electric shock, fire, injury to persons, or exposure to excessive microwave energy, basic safety precautions should be followed, including the following:

- 1. Read all instructions before using the appliance.
- 2. Read and follow the specific "PRECAUTIONS TO AVOID POSSIBLE EXPOSURE TO EXCESSIVE MICROWAVE ENERGY" on page 3.
- 3. This appliance must be grounded. Connect only to properly grounded outlet. See "GROUNDING INSTRUCTIONS" on page 4.
- 4. Install or locate this appliance only in accordance with the provided installation instructions.
- 5. Some items such as whole eggs and sealed containers for example, closed glass jars are able to explode and should not be heated in this oven.
- 6. Use this appliance only for its intended use as described in this manual. Do not use corrosive chemicals or vapors in this appliance. This type of oven is specifically designed to heat, cook, or dry food. It is not designed for industrial or laboratory use.
- 7. As with any appliance, close supervision is necessary when used by children.
- 8. To reduce the risk of fire in the oven cavity:
 - Do not overcook food. Carefully attend appliance when paper, plastic, or other combustible materials are placed inside the oven to facilitate cooking.
 - b. Remove wire twist-ties from paper or plastic bags before placing bag in oven.
 - c. If materials inside the oven should ignite, keep oven door closed, turn oven off, and disconnect the power cord or shut off power at the fuse or circuit breaker panel.
 - d. Do not use the cavity for storage purposes. Do not leave paper products, cooking utensils or food in the cavity when not in use.
- 9. Liquids, such as water, coffee, or tea are able to be overheated beyond the boiling point without appearing to be boiling due to surface tension of the liquid. Visible bubbling or boiling when the container is removed from the microwave oven is not always present. THIS COULD RESULT IN VERY HOT LIQUIDS SUDDENLY BOILING OVER WHEN A SPOON OR OTHER UTENSIL IS INSERTED INTO THE LIQUID. To reduce the risk of injury to person:
 - a. Do not overheat the liquid.
 - b. Stir the liquid both before and halfway through heating it.
 - c. Do not use straight-sided containers with narrow necks.
 - d. After heating, allow the container to stand in the microwave oven for a short time before removing the container.
 - e. Use extreme care when inserting a spoon or other utensil into the container.
- 10. Do not heat oil or fat for deep-frying. It is difficult to control the temperature of oil in microwave oven.
- 11. Pierce foods with heavy skins such as potatoes, whole squash, apples and chestnuts before cooking.
- 12. The contents of feeding bottles and baby jars should be stirred or shaken and the temperature should be checked before serving in order to avoid burns.
- 13. Cooking utensils may become hot because of heat transferred from the heated food. Potholders may be needed to handle the utensil.
- 14. Do not cover or block any openings on the appliance.
- 15. Do not store or use this appliance outdoors. Do not use this product near water, for example, near a kitchen sink, in a wet basement, near a swimming pool, or similar locations.
- 16. Do not operate this appliance if it has a damaged cord or a plug, if it is not working properly or if it has been damaged or dropped.

IMPORTANT SAFETY INSTRUCTIONS (continued)

- 17. Do not immerse cord or plug in water. Keep cord away from heated surface. Do not let cord hang over edge of table or counter.
- 18. Use only thermometers, which are specifically designed for use in microwave ovens.
- 19. Do not operate any heating or cooking appliance beneath this appliance.
- 20. Be certain the glass tray and roller rings are in place when you operate the oven.
- 21. When cleaning microwave oven surface and door, use only mild, nonabrasive soaps or detergents applied with a sponge or soft cloth.
- 22. This microwave oven should be serviced only by qualified service personnel. For service and repair, please contact our Customer Support Center at 1-866-257-3336.

PRECAUTIONS TO AVOID POSSIBLE EXPOSURE TO EXCESSIVE MICROWAVE

ENERGY

- 1. Do not attempt to operate this microwave oven with the door open. Door open operation can result in harmful exposure to microwave energy. It is important not to defeat of tamper with the safety interlocks.
- 2. Do not place any objects between the microwave oven front face and the door, or allow soil or cleaner residue to accumulate on sealing surfaces.
- 3. Do not operate the oven if it is damaged. It is particularly important that the oven door close properly and that there is no damage to the:
 - a. Door (bent),
 - b. Hinges and latches (broken or loosened),
 - c. Door seals and sealing surfaces.
- 4. The microwave oven should not be adjusted or repaired by anyone except properly qualified service personnel.

INSTALLATION GUIDE

- 1. Make sure all packing materials are removed from the inside of the microwave oven door.
- Check the microwave oven for any damage, such as misaligned or bent door, damaged door seals and sealing surface, broken or loose door hinges and latches, and dents inside the cavity or on the door. If there are any damages, do not operate the oven but contact Customer Service at 1-866-257-3336.
- 3. This microwave oven must be placed on a flat, stable surface to hold its weight and the heaviest food likely to be cooked in the oven.
- 4. Do not place the oven where heat, moisture, or high humidity are generated, or near combustible materials.
- 5. For correct operation, the oven must have sufficient airflow. Allow 8" of space above the microwave oven, 4" at the back, and 2" on each side of the unit.
- 6. Do not cover or block any openings on the microwave oven. Do not remove microwave oven feet. Do not operate the oven without the glass tray, roller support, and shaft in their proper positions. Make sure the power supply cord is undamaged and does not run under the microwave or over any hot or sharp surface.
- 7. The socket must be readily accessible so the microwave oven can be easily unplugged in an emergency.

GROUNDING INSTRUCTIONS

This microwave oven must be grounded. In the event of an electrical short circuit, grounding reduces risk of electric shock by providing an escape wire for the electric current. Consult a qualified electrician or serviceman if the grounding instructions are not completely understood, or if doubt exists as to whether the appliance is properly grounded. For questions regarding the grounding instructions, please contact our Customer Support Center at 1-866-257-3336.

Consult a qualified electrician or serviceman if the grounding instructions are not completely understood, or if doubt exists as to whether the appliance is properly grounded, and either:

1) If it is necessary to use an extension cord, use only a 3-wire extension cord that has a 3-blade grounding plug and a 3-slot receptacle that will accept the plug on the appliance. The marked rating of the extension cord shall be equal to or greater than the electrical rating of the appliance, or 2) Do not use an extension cord. If the power supply cord is too short, have a qualified electrician or serviceman installs an outlet near the appliance.

WARNING: Improper use of the grounding plug can result in risk of electric shock.

ELECTRICAL REQUIREMENTS

- The electrical requirements for this microwave oven are a 120V, 60Hz, AC only, 20 amp.
- It is recommended that a separate circuit serving only the microwave be provided.
- The microwave oven is equipped with a 3-prong grounding plug. It must be plugged into a wall outlet properly installed and grounded.


POWER CORD

- A short power supply cord is provided to reduce the risks resulting from becoming entangled in or tripping over a long
- Longer cord sets or extension cords are available and may be used if care is taken in using them.
- If using a longer cord, the marked electrical rating of the cord set or extension cord should be at least as great as the electrical marking of the microwave itself and the extension cord must be a grounded-type 3-wire cord. The longer cord should be arranged so it will not drape over the counter or tabletop where it can be pulled on by children or tripped over unintentionally.

RADIO OR TV INTERFERENCE


Should there be any interference caused by the microwave oven to your radio or TV, check that the microwave oven is on a different circuit, relocated the radio or TV as far away from the oven as feasible or check position and signal of receiving antenna.

CONTROL PANEL



DISPLAY

Cooking time, power, indicators and present time are displayed.

QUICK COOK BUTTONS

Instant settings to cook popular foods.

POWER

Use to set power level. To check power level during time cooking, touch POWER pad.

TIMER

Timer functions independently, even while a cooking program is in process.

COOK

Use for multi-stage cooking. Enables cooking at multiple power and time settings automatically.

COOK BY WEIGHT

Programmed cooking based on weight of foods cooked.

DEFROST BY WEIGHT

Programmed defrosting based on the weight of the foods to be defrosted.

SPEED DEFROST

Quick defrost function that alternates defrost and stand times to quickly and effectively defrost foods.

NUMBER PADS (0-9)

Touch to input time or food weight.

CLOCK

Set current time.

STOP/RESET

Press to cancel setting or reset the oven before setting a cooking program.

EXPRESS

Use this feature to program the oven to microwave food at 100% power conveniently.

• START/MINUTE PLUS

Touch to start cooking or to add an extra minute to your cooking cycle.

INSTALLING THE TURNTABLE

- 1. Never place the glass tray upside down.
- 2. The glass tray should never be restricted.
- 3. Both the glass tray and turntable ring assembly must always be used during cooking.
- 4. All food and containers of food should always be placed on the glass tray for cooking.
- 5. If the glass tray or turntable ring assembly cracks or breaks, call customer service 1-866-257-3336.

OPERATION INSTRUCTIONS

SETTING THE CLOCK

- 1. In waiting mode, touch CLOCK pad.
- 2. Use the number pads to enter the correct time.
- 3. Touch CLOCK pad again.

NOTE: This is a 12-hour clock. When the oven is first plugged in or when power resumes after a power interruption, the display will show ENTER CLOCK TIME. During cooking, you can press CLOCK to check the oven time.

SETTING THE TIMER

- 1. Touch TIMER.
- 2. Enter the amount of time by touching the number pads.
- 3. Touch START/ MINUTE PLUS.

NOTE:

- •Time countdown can be seen in display before clock or cooking time is returned to display.
- •Touch TIMER and then touch STOP/RESET to cancel TIMER during timing process.
- •The longest cooking time you can set is 99 minutes and 99 seconds.

MICROWAVE COOKING

A. One-stage Cooking

- 1. In waiting mode, place food into oven and close it.
- 2. Use the number pads to set a cooking time. You can set a cooking time from one second to 99 minutes and 99 seconds.
- If you want to set a power level other than 100% power, touch POWER, and then use the number pads to enter the power level.
- 4. Touch START/MINUTE PLUS to start cooking.

OPERATION INSTRUCTIONS (continued)

Use single digits to set a cooking power level:

NOTE: During cooking, you can press POWER to check the cooking power.

B. Two-stage Cooking

Some recipes require different stages of cooking at different temperatures.

1. SET STAGE 1:

Follow steps 1 and 2 in "One-stage Cooking". DO NOT TOUCH START/MINUTE PLUS.

2. SET STAGE 2:

Touch COOK then enter proper cooking time and (lower) power level. (Most 2-stage recipes use lower power for second stage.)

3. Touch START/MINUTE PLUS.

NOTE: Speed defrost only can be set in first stage, auto menu, cook by weight, defrost by weight cannot be set in this program.

SPEED DEFROST

- 1. In waiting mode, place food into oven and close it.
- 2. Touch SPEED DEFROST.
- 3. Enter desired defrosting time by touching correct number pads.
- Touch START/MINUTE PLUS.

NOTE:

- •The longest defrosting time is 99 min, 99 sec.
- •During cooking, the oven will pause to remind you to turn food over then close the door and press START/ MINUTE PLUS to resume.

COOK BY WEIGHT

- 1. In waiting mode, place food into oven and close it.
- 2. Touch COOK BY WEIGHT.
- 3. Enter the one digit code by touching the correct number pad (1~3).
- 4. Enter weight by pressing number pads.
- 5. Touch START/MINUTE PLUS.

OPERATION INSTRUCTIONS (continued)

NOTE:

- •Meat must be defrosted and at refrigerated temperature.
- •Weight must be in pounds and ounces.
- •Ounce weights less than 10 must be preceded by a 0. If label gives weight in pounds only, change the fraction of a pound to ounces using the following chart.

- •During cooking, the system will pause automatically and sound to remind user to turn food over, after that touch START/MINUTE PLUS to resume cooking.
- •Let meat stand a few minutes before carving.

EXPRESS

- 1. In waiting mode, place food into oven and close it.
- 2. Press EXPRESS a number of times to enter cooking time. Then the system will operate automatically with full power. Note: During cooking, you can add the cooking time, and the maximum is 10 minutes.

OPERATION INSTRUCTIONS (continued)

DEFROST BY WEIGHT

- 1. In waiting mode, place food into oven and close it.
- 2. Touch DEFROST BY WEIGHT pad.
- 3. Enter weight by touching number pads.
- 4. Touch START/MINUTE PLUS pad.

NOTE:

- •Weight must be in pounds and ounces. Ounce weights less than 10 must be preceded by a 0. If label gives weight in pounds only, change the fraction of a pound to ounces using the chart given above. The maximum weight is 5 lb.4 oz.
- •Turn over food when oven beeps. Touch START/MINUTE PLUS pad to resume defrosting.

SETTING CHILD LOCK

The safety lock prevents unsupervised operation by children. The CHILD LOCK indicator will show up on display screen, and the oven cannot be operated while the CHILD LOCK is set.

To set, in standby mode, press and hold STOP/RESET for 3 seconds. LOCK is indicated on the display.

To cancel, press and hold STOP/RESET for 3 seconds. LOCK indication disappears.

QUICK COOK SETTINGS

The QUICK COOK settings allow you to cook or reheat food automatically without entering power level or time. For smaller portions, simply touch the applicable pad and start. For larger portions, push the pad twice. FROZEN DINNER, POTATO and BEVERAGE allow you to cook multiple amounts of the same food. Simply touch pad once, and ENTER AMT appears in the display. Enter the amount of servings and start.

POPCORN

- 1. Touch POPCORN.
- CODE and cooking time appears in the display. POPCORN automatically sets the cooking time for a 3.5 oz. bag of microwave popcorn.
- 3. Touch START/MINUTE PLUS.

NOTE:

• To change the preset POPCORN time: Touch POPCORN twice. ENTER TIME appears in display. Touch number pads to enter minutes and seconds. Touch START/MINUTE PLUS. The longest cooking time is 99 min, 99 sec. This new cooking time will be set as the default one until you change it or next power on.

QUICK COOK SETTINGS (continued)

POTATO

For 4 to 6 oz. potatoes:

- 1. Touch POTATO once.
- 2. Enter number of potatoes by touching number pads from 1 to 4.
- Touch START/MINUTE PLUS.

For the large 8 to 10 oz. potatoes:

- 1. Touch POTATO twice.
- 2. Enter number of potatoes by touching number pads from 1 to 4.
- 3. Touch START/MINUTE PLUS.

PIZZA

Reheating a slice of pizza:

- 1. Touch PIZZA once. CODE and cooking time appears.
- 2. Touch START/MINUTE PLUS.

Heating a whole frozen pizza:

- 1. Touch PIZZA twice. CODE and cooking time appears.
- 2. Touch START/MINUTE PLUS.

BEVERAGE

For 5 to 7 oz. cups:

- 1. Touch BEVERAGE once.
- 2. Enter number of cups by touching number pads from 1 to 4.
- 3. Touch START/MINUTE PLUS.

For the larger 9 to 11 oz. cups:

- 1. Touch BEVERAGE twice.
- 2. Enter number of mugs by touching number pads from 1 to 4.
- 3. Touch START/MINUTE PLUS.

FROZEN DINNER

For one or two small (7~9 oz.) frozen dinner:

- 1. Touch FROZEN DINNER once.
- 2. For 1 entree, touch the number pad "1". For 2 entrees, touch the number pad "2".
- 3. Touch START/MINUTE PLUS pad.

QUICK COOK SETTINGS (continued)

Microwaving one large (10~12 oz.) frozen dinner:

- 1. Touch FROZEN DINNER twice.
- 2. For 1 entree, touch the number pad "1". For 2 entrees, touch the number pad "2".
- Touch START/MINUTE PLUS.

REHEAT

- 1. Touch REHEAT pad. CODE and cooking time appears.
- 2. Touch START/MINUTE PLUS.

FRESH VEGETABLE

Touch FRESH VEGETABLE pad.

- 1. Touch number pad (1~6) to enter food share.
- 2. Touch START/MINUTE PLUS.

FROZEN VEGETABLE

Touch FROZEN VEGETABLE pad.

- 1. Touch number pad (1~6) to enter food share.
- 2. Touch START/MINUTE PLUS.

SOUP

Touch SOUP pad.

- 1. Touch number pad (1~4) to enter food share.
- 2. Touch START/MINUTE PLUS.

COOKING UTENSILS GUIDE

This section lists which utensils can be used in this microwave, which have limited use for short periods, and which should not be used in this microwave.

RECOMMENDED

Microwave browning dish -- Use to brown the exterior of small items such as steaks, chops, or pancakes. Follow the directions provided with your browning dish.

Microwaveable plastic wrap -- Use to retain steam. Leave a small opening for some steam to escape and avoid placing it directly on the food.

Paper towels and napkins -- Use for short-term heating and covering; these absorb excess moisture and prevent splattering. Do not use recycled paper towels which may contain metal and could ignite.

Glass and glass-ceramic bowls and dishes -- Use for heating and cooking.

Paper plates and cups -- Use for short-term heating at low temperatures. Do not use recycled paper which may contain metal and could ignite.

Wax paper -- Use as a cover to prevent splattering.

Thermometers -- Use only those labeled "Microwave Safe" and follow all directions. Check the food in several places. Conventional thermometers may be used on microwaved food once the food has been removed from the microwave.

LIMITED USE

Aluminum foil -- Use narrow strips of foil to prevent overcooking exposed areas. Using too much foil can damage your microwave, so be careful. Keep 1" between foil and microwave cavity.

Ceramic, porcelain, and stoneware -- Use these if they are labeled "Microwave Safe". If they are not labeled, test them to make sure they can be used safely.

Plastic -- Only use if labeled "Microwave Safe". Other plastics may melt.

NOT RECOMMENDED

Glass jars and bottles -- Regular glass is too thin to be used in a microwave. It can shatter and cause damage and injury.

Paper bags -- These are a fire hazard, except for popcorn bags that are designed for microwave use.

Styrofoam plates and cups -- These can melt and leave unhealthy residue on food.

Plastic storage and food containers -- Containers such as margarine tubs can melt in the microwave.

Metal utensils -- These can damage your microwave. Remove all metal before cooking.

Note:

• Should you wish to check if a dish is safe for microwaving, place the empty dish in the microwave and microwave on high for 30 seconds. A dish that becomes very hot should not be used.

COOKING TECHNIQUES

Your microwave makes cooking easier than conventional cooking, provided you keep these considerations in mind:

STIRRING

- Stir foods such as casseroles and vegetables while cooking to distribute heat evenly.
- Food at the outside of the dish absorbs more energy and heats quicker, so stir from the outside to the center.
- The microwave will turn off when you open the door to stir your food.

ARRANGEMENT

- Arrange evenly shaped foods, such as chicken pieces or chops, with the thicker, meatier parts towards the outside
 of the turntable where they receive more microwave energy.
- To prevent overcooking, place delicate areas, such as asparagus tips, towards the center of the turntable.

SHIELDING

- Shield food with narrow strips of aluminum foil to prevent overcooking.
- Areas that need shielding include poultry wing tips, the ends of poultry legs, and corners of square baking dishes.
- Use only small amounts of aluminum foil, as larger amounts may damage your microwave.

TURNING

- Turn foods over midway through cooking to expose all parts to microwave energy.
- This is especially important when cooking large foods such as roasts.

STANDING

- Foods cooked in a microwave build up internal heat and continue to cook for a few minutes after heating stops.
- Let foods stand to complete cooking, especially for foods such as cakes and whole vegetables.
- Roasts need this time to complete cooking in the center without overcooking the outer areas.
- All liquids, such as soup or hot chocolate, should be shaken or stirred when cooking is complete.
- When heating baby food, stir well after removing from microwave and test temperature before serving.

ADDING MOISTURE

Microwave energy is attracted to water molecules.

- Food that is uneven in moisture content should be covered or allowed to stand so that the heat disperses evenly.
- Add a small amount of water to dry food to help it cook.

CLEANING AND CARE

- 1. Turn off the microwave and unplug the power cord from the wall when cleaning.
- 2. Keep the inside of the microwave oven clean. When food splatters or spilled liquids adhere to microwave walls, wipe with a damp cloth. Mild detergents may be used if the microwave gets very dirty. Avoid using spray or other harsh cleaners. They may stain, streak, or dull the door surface.
- 3. The outside of the microwave should be cleaned with a damp cloth. To prevent damage to the operating parts inside the microwave, water should not be allowed to seep into the ventilation openings.
- 4. Wipe the window on both sides with a damp cloth to remove any spills or splatters.
- 5. Do not allow the control panel to become wet. Clean with a soft, damp cloth. When cleaning the panel, leave the microwave door open to prevent it from accidentally turning on.
- If steam accumulates inside or around the outside of the door, wipe with a soft cloth. This may occur when the microwave is operated under high humidity. In such case, it is normal.
- 7. It may be necessary to remove the glass tray for cleaning. Wash the tray in warm, soapy water or in a dishwasher. The roller ring and microwave floor should be cleaned regularly to avoid excessive noise. Wipe the bottom surface of the microwave with a mild detergent.
- The roller ring may be washed in mild, soapy water or in a dishwasher. When removing the roller ring, be sure to replace it in the proper position.
- Remove odors from your microwave by combining a cup of water with the juice and skin of one lemon in a microwaveable bowl. Microwave for 5 minutes. Wipe thoroughly and dry with a soft cloth.
- 10. If the light bulb burns out, please contact customer service (1-866-257-3336) to have it replaced.
- 11. The microwave should be cleaned regularly and any food deposits should be removed. Failure to maintain the microwave in a clean condition could lead to deterioration of surfaces that could adversely affect the life of the unit and could possibly result in a hazardous situation.
- 12. Please do not dispose of this appliance into a regular garbage receptacle. Please check to see where you can dispose such appliances.

BEFORE CALLING FOR SERVICE

Before asking for service, please check each item below:

- Check to ensure the microwave is plugged in securely. If not, remove the plug from the outlet, wait 10 seconds, and plug it in again securely.
- Check for a blown circuit fuse or a tripped main circuit breaker. If these seem to be operating properly, test the outlet with another appliance.
- Check to ensure the control panel is programmed correctly and the timer is set.
- Check to ensure the door is securely closed, engaging the door safety lock system. If the door is not properly closed, the
 microwave energy will not flow inside.
